2 Chronicles 7:11-16 v. 14 “if my people, who are called by name, will humble themselves and pray and seek my face and turn from their wicked ways, then will I hear from heaven and will forgive their sin and will heal their land.”(NIV)

“Repentance” is the action of repenting, a sincere regret or remorse, of turning from evil and turning to the good. “Each person who turns to God in genuine repentance and faith will be saved.” Repentance is a basic and an all important beginning to our life of faith. We read in 2 Corinthians 7:10 that “Godly sorrow produces repentance leading to salvation....” “Conviction of sin is one of the most uncommon things that ever happens to a person. It is the beginning of

an understanding of God” (Oswald Chambers). His love for us in Jesus Christ that brings us to the point of saying, “I have sinned.”

The result of repentance is forgiveness and cleansing expressed in healing, hope, happiness, wholeness and oneness with God. The Word says “then I (God) will ...forgive their sin and will heal their land”. Repentance opens the “door” to God’s love, mercy and grace experienced in that new life in Jesus Christ.

Charles Sheldon, a minister from Topeka, Kansas started a sermon series in 1886. He told entertaining stories of people finding themselves in moral dilemmas. To make it

more interesting, he would end each story as a cliffhanger to encourage the audience to come back the next Sunday. These sermons became very popular and were soon published in a book. The book became one of the top 50 best-selling books of all time. He earned very little from this because of a copyright error. He didn't seem to care as long as the message was being spread and he hoped more people would spend time contemplating Jesus because of it.

How did it become a huge market of WWJD bracelets and other products in the 1990's? A youth director, Janie Tinklenberg of Holland, Michigan read Sheldon's book. She wanted her students to keep the slogan in their minds. She abbreviated it so that it would fit on bracelets and it prompted

others to ask what it meant. She had stumbled on a goldmine. She felt it was getting out of hand after seeing a \$400 necklace with W.W.J.D on it and a board game was created. To try and take control of it and use the money to start a non-profit youth ministry, she applied for the trademark. She was told she waited too late similar to the problem that Sheldon had with the copyright of his book. The irony here is that the companies made millions on a slogan that they never followed.
